# Nuclear Security and Peaceful Uses

Negative perceptions about peaceful uses and risks related to nuclear and other radioactive material

# Challenges

- Budget constraints and funding priorities
- Legislative and funding incentives
- Impact of security measures on radioactive source availability

# Nuclear Security and Peaceful Uses

Multifaceted approach of innovative and collaborative solutions is required to reconcile objectives of nuclear security and the expansion of peaceful uses

- Promote the benefits of peaceful uses
- Conduct high-level outreach
- Promote balance between regulation of and access to peaceful uses
- Foster new partnerships for expanded access to peaceful uses

NGOs play a pivotal role improve communication between diverse stakeholders

conduct independent research and analysis

develop capacity to guide policy making

# Civil Society role - Philanthropic organisations

The contribution of Peaceful Uses to sustainable development and to climate mitigation is not recognised by philanthropies



Several philanthropies support nuclear threat and risk reduction and securing nuclear and other radioactive materials \$30 million (USD) in 2012

Climate philanthropies support the goal of achieving net-zero carbon emissions by 2050 \$8 billion (USD) per annum


Philanthropies support sustainable development \$10 billion (USD) in 2020 (OECD)
